Dr Butler recreates a real interview environment, and helps candidates gain confidence in the process of Oxford or Cambridge applications. He conducts practice interviews with students, after which he gives immediate advice and feedback.

The Oxbridge Interview Support programme has grown over the years, and we are proud to host students for other schools in the county which benefit from our provision. This year, students from Northampton School for Girls, Latimer School and Wollaston School joined our students and benefited from the sessions.

RSC PERFORMANCE OF 'OTHELLO'

Members of the English Faculty accompanied our Year 12 and 13 English students to Stratford for a performance of Shakespeare's 'Othello'. It was a fantastic production and our students did us proud. A huge thank you to all staff – particularly to Mrs Pointer who organised the trip. It was a pleasure to be part of the experience despite the very late return to school! **Mrs Lane**

"As <u>Othello</u> is one of the A' level English set texts, we were all looking forward to an evening trip to Stratford upon Avon to watch the play at the theatre. And we were not disappointed!

This RSC production was filled with powerful performances from beginning to end. And it wasn't just the acting; the play was infused with fantastic choreography and haunting singing, making it a very enjoyable experience.

The actor who played Othello was outstanding and captured the range of emotion needed for the protagonist. He played the role sympathetically and every word was enunciated superbly - albeit with a slightly American accent!

The portrayals of Desdemona and lago were spot on. lago was typically slimy and duplicitous: it was a highly effective portrayal of this villain causing much amusement and engagement. The actor playing Desdemona brought sincerity and pathos to the role, particularly in the last few scenes, where the tragic climax was reached. This performance was extremely effective. There were a few of us in need of tissues! Emilia produced a standout performance, especially during the confrontations at the play's climax. Others who played the roles of Bianca, Roderigo, Cassio, Lodovico and Brabantio, served fantastically and utilised their stage time perfectly.

One standout – and unexpected - moment at the end was the rendition of a Latin song, showcasing the wonderful voices of the actors, which cultivated a palpable feeling of sadness. The other aspects of the production that added to the enjoyment of it were the sumptuous costumes – all in a Renaissance style – and the minimalis, light infused set design, which was modern yet seemed to go beautifully with the rest of the production, giving audiences just a hint of the setting of each scene without overshadowing the action.

No one was out of place and fantastic performances, coupled with marvellous choreography, created a memorable atmosphere and a production that we think Shakespeare himself would have been proud of!"

Digital Leaders' Advice



Loot Boxes

One of the relatively new game developments over the last few years is the introduction of loot boxes in child-targeted gaming. While loot boxes sound like adorable surprise gifts your child might get in-game, they normally cost real money and can be expensive and addictive.

Researchers have found, that because loot boxes offer rewards based on gambling-like odds, children are more susceptible to accidentally learning these negative behaviours. Loot boxes prey on the promise of a rare or powerful in-game asset which can feel exhilarating. However these rare items have little odds and instead of putting of children off it encourages even more insatiable purchases and a danger of developing gambling habits.



How to support your child:

- Via the use of parental controls. On some devices parents can prevent children from playing games with "in game" / "in app purchases".
- Have a conversation with your child if they wish to buy an item in game. Many items are cosmetic and can cost between £5 - £30 each.
- Check what your child is spending a voucher on. Are they using the voucher to buy a game or simply for a "chance" of getting a rare item?
