## **Black History Month**

#BestOfBishop

Black History Month in the UK takes place during October each year. It recognises and celebrates the achievements, art, history and excellence of African and African Caribbean communities. This year, the theme of Black History Month is 'Reclaiming Narratives", with the focus being on recognising and correcting the narratives of black history and culture. Black History Month is an important focus to bring hidden histories to light, to consider the biases that historians may have taken when documenting events and to evaluate the importance of multifaceted perspectives.

Our History department has developed the curriculum so that Black History is embedded, raising awareness of the contributions which communities and individuals have made over the centuries in shaping the dynamic and diverse country we have today. For example, in Year 7 we learn about the significance of local Kettering and Northamptonshire individuals. These include Lilian Bader (one of the first black women to join the British armed forces) as well as Walter Tull, the second person of African-Caribbean mixed heritage to play in the top division of the football league and who joined Northampton Town FC in 1911. Tull went on to serve as the first African-Caribbean mixed heritage man commissioned as an infantry officer in World War 1.

In Year 8, we uncover the lives of some of the approximately 200 black people living in Tudor England. The most notable was John Blanke, employed as a trumpeter by Henry VII and Henry VIII. We explore the West African kingdom of Benin and the Songhai Empire prior to the arrival of European slave traders, before considering the impact of the transatlantic slave trade for African people in this shameful aspect of the British Empire. In Year 9, we continue the thread by exploring the civil rights movement as part of our learning about protest. We also focus on civil rights protests in the UK, with a focus on prominent campaigns led by activists Paul Stephenson, Guy Bailey and Roy Hackett during the Bristol Bus Boycott.

We look forward to continuing to reflect on the many narratives in our Culture Day today.




### Safe Space

## **Art Workshop**









On Monday 16<sup>th</sup> October, a group of Year 9 students had the opportunity to meet and respond to the work of local artist Jack Watto. Jack's recent work entitled 'Art for Planet Earth' focuses on issues impacting us in society today, such as plastic pollution destroying our seas, diminishing habitats for wildlife and deforestation.

Students had the privilege of viewing some paintings and were blown away by the scale and complexity of the artwork – particularly when they found out that that one of the 6ft pieces had only taken Jack an hour to complete!

Joining Jack for the workshop was his wife and collaborator Maura Bright, who was able to help the students to understand the research that they had both undertaken to inform and inspire the art. Year 9 students are currently working on an art piece with the theme 'Art with a Message'. The workshop enabled them to see how art can not only question but challenge what is happening in the world around us.

After an introductory talk from Jack about the ideas behind his paintings, students then collaborated in small groups to create their own environmentally themed artwork.

"I learned that art is very powerful, especially when it has a meaning behind it."


"I like doing the actual painting, and listening to the artist reasoning and views of his own work."

# Snapchat

## What is Snapchat?

Snapchat is an amazing tool for both communication and entertainment. It's very popular amongst teenagers. However, it can be dangerous which reflects its new 16+ age rating. There are ways to stay safe when using the app.

#### What are the dangers?

- Anyone can add anyone else and communicate with them on default settings.
- As snaps delete after a short amount of time, teens believe the tool is safer for sending sensitive pictures.
- Because snaps are only available for a short amount of time, it becomes impossible to track what has been received from friends, family and even strangers.



Only add people you know.

- You can 'ignore' people who have added you who you don't recognise.
- You can also choose to unadd or block friends you have accidentally added or no longer speak with.

Keep your location hidden.

- You can disable location services on the device.
- You can also use 'ghost mode' which keeps your location private.
- Location can be turned on for only specified people for safety.

#### Making private stories


- You can choose whether Snaps you post are to be seen by everyone or just to certain people by making 'private stories'.
- Do not feel pressured to post anything
- There is a 'public story' feature which should be switched off and can found in the settings.
