## **Safe Space**

#### Financial anxiety

There is much in the news at the moment about the impact of global tariffs and the potential for financial disruption. Research is showing that our young people are more concerned about global issues than previous generations. This is at least partially likely because their engagement with social media provides them with more information and news. Young people may, therefore, be thinking more about the cost of living and how these changes impact them and their loved ones.

Online safety, including protections against financial fraud, are taught as part of the curriculum and covered in assemblies, too. But it can be helpful to have resources which help to guide conversations at home.

UK Finance is a collaborative which funds education about financial matters. It has launched a project about money muling, a form of money laundering targeted at students. ## **Belgium Battlefields Trip: Year 10 Reflections**

This trip was amazing and helped me understand our course even more. We arrived in Ypres and started touring, getting to see the uniforms and weapons used in The Great War, and learn about the lives of specific soldiers at the 'In Flanders Fields' Museum. We also went to Lijssenhoek Military Cemetery and Tyne Cot Cemetery, which, despite being very solemn and poignant experiences, were peaceful and chances to put into perspective the effort of the soldiers. It helped me be more grateful for their sacrifice.

Reliving the cramped conditions of both Allied and German trenches was interesting. Thankfully they were quite dry, so we had no cases of trench foot! We saw significant buildings like Talbot House, where soldiers stayed when they weren't fighting, and we visited its Chapel, still preserved as it was in World War One. We saw monuments like Vimy Ridge - of gratitude for the Canadian help in France. However, my favourite experience would have to be the Menin Gate ceremony and its nightly display of commemoration for the war effort.

It would be a crime if I didn't mention the shops we got to visit in our free time – especially the chocolate shop and the other dessert shops. The chocolate shop was expecting us and gave us all 10% off, leaving us even more money to spend on other desserts and souvenirs!

While it was an amazing trip for sightseeing, it also related to our course regarding medicine in World War One. We got to experience the narrow, zig-zag trenches that were difficult for stretcher-bearers to carry wounded men through; the Chapel where many soldiers would have sought refuge from their traumatic experiences the artillery and shells that caused injuries so that plastic surgery and skin grafts had to be improved, and how soldiers only had a 20% survival rate from broken femurs were fascinating to analyse.

## **Hampton Court Palace Trip: Year 12 Reflections**

After an early start, we arrived at the Palace and were met by our guide. We were taken to a room where we sat through a presentation on our main question of the day- "Was there a mid-Tudor crisis?' We were given the definition of a crisis- a period in which the government or religion of a country came close to collapse- and we were advised to base our inquiries on this. We were also asked about our initial views, and the majority of us agreed initially that there was a mid-Tudor crisis. We were then given source booklets we would use before heading out into the Palace.

We started at the main gate where we noted its size and luxurious design, exemplifying the wealth of the Tudors. We also found out that the Tudor court moved from manor to manor often, as the two huge holes on either side of the entrance were filled with all the waste produced by the court. We were glad that they were no longer used! We than entered the main court where we were split into groups to analyse our first sources. My group was given a source of a Tudor noble having to bring his own candles and wine to Hampton Court. This could support the view of a crisis as the Tudor monarch could no longer afford to provide as much for guests.

We then moved on to the Clock Court. The huge clock showed the time, the date and even the star sign. From here, we entered the Great Hall of Henry VIII. While grand and impressive, what surprised me was the insights it gave into the King himself. It was decorated with tapestries depicting the story of Abraham who was miraculously given a son by God. Henry saw himself as an Abrahamic patriarch and wanted to emphasise this view to his subjects. Then were the two great stained-glass windows on each side, depicting Henry's royal line, his wives, and the Tudor Rose, with Henry himself at the centre of both. In the Hall we analysed our next sources on the fall of Somerset during Edward's reign.

We then entered the next room where only the Monarch's closest advisors could enter. We discussed sources from Mary's reign describing the succession crisis with Lady Jane Grey and her marriage to Phillip of Spain. Then to conclude our tour, we entered the Privy Council where we were asked our final opinion on whether there was a Mid-Tudor Crisis. Many agreed, citing Somerset's fall as the main period of crisis. However, I sided with our guide and other historians who argue that although there were problems, there was never a period of crisis. All problems were swiftly resolved and Somerset was replaced by Northumberland soon after his fall.

After our tour, and a hard morning of detective work, we explored the grounds. We walked around the large gardens, saw paintings linked to our course, such as one of the field of the cloth of gold, and raced through the world oldest hedge maze, before heading back to the coach to travel home.

## Parenting in the Digital Age

#### **Key Insights from the Parent Forum**

Just before Easter, we hosted a highly informative Parent Forum focused on "Parenting in the Digital Age." The event in-person and online, saw a good turnout of parents keen to understand and navigate the challenges and opportunities of raising children in today's digital world.

Head of Computer Science, Mr. Reilly, led the session. He provided valuable insights and practical strategies across several key areas. The discussion underscored the critical role parents play in equipping their children with the skills to thrive safely and responsibly online.

#### **Key Topics Covered**

Online Dangers and School Policies Mr. Reilly highlighted the constant online challenges students face and detailed the school's proactive measures, including curriculum monitoring software, to ensure online safety.

The Impact of Screen Time With the startling statistic that the average UK teenager spends over 8 hours daily on devices, the Forum addressed the potential negative impacts on sleep, mental health, and physical activity. We shared practical tips for managing screen time through device settings and family rules.

Navigating Social Media The session explored the complexities of social media, acknowledging its benefits and the risks of inappropriate content and unwanted contact. Parents were urged to review privacy settings and be aware of potentially risky apps like WhatsApp, Telegram, and TikTok.

Challenges of Online Gaming We considered gaming addiction, exposure to inappropriate content and potential links to social isolation and poor mental health. Guidance on parental controls on gaming consoles was provided.

The Responsible Use of AI Mr. Reilly introduced the importance of understanding and guiding children in the responsible use of Artificial Intelligence. The session highlighted the benefits and the risks, emphasising the need for parents and children to learn about AI together.

#### **Practical Action Points for Parents:**

The Parent Forum concluded with clear actionable steps for parents :

- Explore and adjust screen time settings on your child's devices to establish healthy limits.
- Have open family conversations about social media use and work together to adjust privacy settings for greater safety.
- Investigate and implement parental control settings on gaming consoles to manage time and content.
- Take the opportunity to learn about AI to ensure responsible and ethical use.

We will provide resources, including fact sheets on social media settings, and sharing the session's slides and information via email and our website.

We appreciate the active participation and commitment of parents. The insights shared during the Parent Forum were helpful and we trust we have empowered many to support their children in navigating the digital landscape safely and confidently. By working in partnership, we can ensure our students develop the crucial digital literacy skills necessary for their future success.
