Safe Space - Bulking and Cutting

At the end of last term, I wrote about a new trend for 'Looksmaxxing' - especially amongst young men. The BBC has published an article about how the desire to look good is shown through a processing of *bulking* and *cutting*. This routine sees young people (often boys aged 12 – 18), increasing their calorie intake significantly for a number of weeks before *cutting* – reducing it to lose weight and define muscles. This, along with intense workouts, is to achieve a particular physique, often celebrated through the hashtag "#shreddedphysique".

While there is real merit in living healthily, balancing diet and exercise, dieticians warn of the risks of this *cut and bulk* process. Quite often the additional calories are from highly processed foods, and the rapid change between high and lower consumption of calories can put significant strain on the body.

At school, we explore what it means to live healthily, and we have worked with the Local Authority to gain our Healthy Schools Bronze Award. We are conscious, however, that online content can lead to changes in behaviour and some young people experience body shaming through taunts or images sent via social media. Please be vigilant about checking the content your children are seeing, and the messages they are receiving.

If you have any concerns about behaviours you feel may be unhelpful or unhealthy, or if you need to report an incident of body shaming, please don't hesitate to contact your child's form tutor or Head of Year.

William Knibb; Bishop Stopford School Celebrates


Kettering Civic society organised an exhibition relating to William Knibb at the Toller Meeting rooms on Saturday 21st September. They have worked tirelessly to celebrate his achievements and asked us to submit an artwork to help commemorate his life and work, alongside the work of local artist Daniel Kelly.

So during super curricular week, students collaborated to create a painting celebrating Knibb's life and legacy.

Knibb was a local Baptist minister and a key figure in the abolition of slavery. Until the recent transition to North Northants CC, the Kettering Council coat of arms had the emblem of a freed slave in recognition of William Knibb.

He worked tirelessly for the education and rights of Jamaican citizens and he is proudly celebrated in Jamaica today.

A huge thank you to Miss Abe and Mrs Fray, along with Eleanor Donlevy (8Y) and Nella Adu (8Y) who were invited to the opening of the exhibition, also attended by the Mayor of Kettering (photo on front page)





Mrs Abe said, "This painting is about Kettering born abolitionist William Knibb. As part of the Bishop Stopford community, some students and I have proudly created this artwork to symbolises= the honour and impact Knibb's life had and still has on future generations.

There were a few key things we focussed on. Firstly, we have a William Knibb quotation right at the top of the painting. This is also the motto of the first school he founded in Jamaica – the William Knibb High School. Its badge can be found painted in white and purple, a colour used to symbolise royalty. By coincidence, we discovered that this was the school that famous sprinter Usain Bolt attended.

So we came up with the idea of having a young Usain Bolt in his William Knibb Highschool uniform. He is shown breaking free from the shackles of prejudice and limitations, later to become the fastest man in the world – breaking records as well as barriers. We also depicted the first church Knibb founded in 1838, the Baptist Chapel in Falmouth Jamaica. This church still stands strong today and continues to honour his memory. There's a map of Jamaica hidden in the bottom corner, as well as a mosaic of the Jamaican flag making a subtle appearance in the background. As a remembrance of his many brave and valiant actions, we included his Jamaican Order of Merit, awarded to him on the 150th anniversary of the abolition of slavery in the British Empire 1988. At the left side we added the symbol of his faith – Christianity. As a Church of England school, we believe that Christianity expresses the fundamentals of human respect, decency and love toward one another, the very same things Knibb stood for."

Post-16 Options Morning

On Thursday 2nd October, all Year 11 students will be taking part in our Post-16 Options Morning. This is an important part of the support we provide to help students start thinking carefully about their future after GCSEs.

The morning will begin with a series of talks from a wide range of providers. Students will hear from those offering A levels, technical qualifications, and apprenticeships, giving them a chance to understand the differences between each route and the opportunities they can lead to. These sessions are designed to broaden horizons and encourage students to think about the path that best matches their skills, interests, and ambitions.

Afterwards, students will move on to a Careers and Options Fair, where they can meet representatives from local colleges, universities, and employers. This will be a fantastic opportunity for students to ask questions directly, collect information, and begin exploring the skills and qualifications needed for different career pathways. We hope that these conversations will help inspire our students and give them greater confidence in the decisions they will make later this year.

The Post-16 Options Morning is an important milestone in our careers education programme. We encourage parents and carers to follow up by talking with their child at home about what they found interesting or surprising. These discussions play a big part in helping students to make informed, thoughtful decisions about the next stage of their education.

Radio Appearance

"Last week I had the opportunity to speak at North Northamptonshire Council regarding their decision to push back net zero targets to 2050. I gave a three-minute speech outlining the effects this would have on young people in the UK and across the world, as well as outlining the impact of climate change on both mental and physical health. Unfortunately, the Executive Committee passed the motion unanimously, but other councillors are working to ensure that the environment remains an important consideration in the council's decisions going forward."

"I was later approached by a BBC journalist who was present at the meeting, who invited me to speak on BBC Radio Northampton regarding the Council's decision and my experience speaking at the meeting. This involved a (very early!) trip to the studio where I was interviewed live on air by the morning presenter Annabel Amos. It was a somewhat stressful experience but also a rewarding one, allowing me to develop public speaking skills under pressure, as well as holding our politicians accountable to the young people they represent."
