At our school, we know that strong parent and student engagement is key to fostering a great learning environment. The aim is that everyone feels valued and involved in the school community.

Just before half term, we will hold our first online Progress Review of the academic year. This provides an opportunity for parents of Year 11 students to meet their child's teachers and discuss academic and pastoral progress. Progress Reviews also allow students to have one-to-one discussions with teachers about their strengths and areas for improvement.

We will shortly be sending a link to our annual Parent Survey, asking for reflections on a number of aspects of school life. The data from our Parent Survey is always valuable in helping us to continue to strengthen our practice.

Our Parent Forum is yet another avenue for parents to connect, share ideas and contribute to decision-making processes. This is a face to face meeting, where we take the time to explore a topic in detail and develop policy or practice as a result. Last year, our themes included Year 6 Induction and Transition, SEND provision and behaviour. Our next theme will be Literacy.

Our Student Council is a group of elected students who represent the interests of their peers. This isn't led by staff, but by Molly and Githu – two of our Student Leaders. They play a vital role in shaping school culture, and advocating for student needs. The Student Council works closely with senior leaders to ensure that students' voices are heard.

By working together, we continue to create an inclusive and collaborative school community and respond well to needs as they arise. We encourage everyone to be involved: your voice matters to us!

Safe Space – Anti Bullying Policy

Over the last year, we have worked closely around the issue of bullying. We focused on the feedback from our last Ofsted report, building a culture where students feel able to report any concerns. We're delighted with their response; not only have we seen an increase in reporting of incidents, we have also been very proud to see our students act as upstanders, challenging inappropriate language or behaviour from their peers.

We were thrilled to achieve our Silver Anti-Bullying Award from United Against Bullying in March 2024 and since then have continued to work with students to ensure it remains a core area of focus for the whole community.

We thought it would be helpful to share some statistics about behaviour with you. Last academic year, students achieved 93,759 achievement points, received 10,751 behaviour points, and there were 14 reported cases of bullying. We followed up with families in these cases and all students reported that the behaviour had stopped following intervention. We recognise that some situations can take a little longer to resolve than others, but we're proud to see resolutions in all areas and grateful to work with such a supportive parent community.

We Are a School that Reads!

The limits of my language means the limits of my world. (Wittgenstein)

Reading for pleasure is the most important indicator of the future success of a child (OECD, 2002), and improvements in literacy, at any point in life, can have a profound effect on an individual. At Bishop Stopford School, reading is always high on the agenda. And here are a few research-based reasons why:

1.Reading improves vocabulary

As we read, we encounter new words, phrases and writing styles. Children sometimes stumble over words they do not know how to pronounce or are not sure of their meanings. They encounter new words more frequently and therefore can see them better in their context. As a parent, listen to your children read if you can! Help them with pronunciation and it will really support their development.

2. Reading improves comprehension

Children who are encouraged to read at an early age have better comprehension of things around them. They develop smart thinking abilities and are more receptive to creativity and ideas that other children their age lack.

3. Reading develops critical thinking skills

Books make us ask questions. What elements are there in a story to draw a particular conclusion? Or if a book is non-fiction we may sometimes ask ourselves about the degree to which we agree with what's been written. Critical thinking skills are crucial when it comes to making important day to day decisions.

4. Reading improves memory

Every time we read a book, we build memory muscle!. As our brains learn to remember what we've read, so our memory becomes better. And with every new memory we create, we create new pathways and this strengthens the existing ones.

5. Reading broadens horizons

By reading books, we glimpse other cultures and places. Books expand our horizons, letting us see other countries and other people and cultures. It's the perfect way to visit the unfamiliar without moving!

From the above, you will understand why reading is such a priority for us! Library lessons, Bedrock learning, English lessons, reading challenges and Reading Partners are only the start. And we encourage you to keep reading together at home: it makes a world of difference.

Reading underpins our Intent: 'to develop highly literate and knowledgeable learners' and 'our curriculum enables *all* learners to progress, though development of a rich language base and challenge in every lesson.

Key Stage 3 students have opportunities to read a book of their choice once a week during form time for twenty minutes. Over an academic year, they improve their word exposure by something like 1,800,000 words. In addition, Year 7 and 8 students undertake Bedrock Learning, an online programme to acquire new, ambitious vocabulary and apply this different contexts and subject disciplines.

Older students have access to JSTOR - a digital library and research platform which provides access to more than 12 million <u>academic journal articles</u>, <u>books</u>, and <u>primary sources</u> in 75 disciplines. https://bishopstopford.fireflycloud.net/library/additional-resources. RE: Nationwide Allergy Warning on behalf of the Food Standards Agency

The Food Standards Agency has made us aware they're warning people with a peanut allergy to avoid consuming foods that contain, or might contain, mustard, mustard powder, or mustard flour, because these ingredients may have been contaminated with peanuts. These ingredients can be found in food such as dips, sauces, pre-made salads, pasta, curries, cake products, custards and sandwiches.

The Food Standards Agency is working hard to identify the products which may have been contaminated with these mustard ingredients because of the severity of some allergic reactions to peanuts. Therefore, as a precautionary measure, we wanted to ensure our parents, guardians, schools and staff are aware of this situation so people with a peanut allergy have up to date information about the potential risk and can take action to keep themselves and their children safe. At this stage none of our suppliers have recalled any products, however, this is a fast-moving situation and may change as FSA releases further information.

Whilst the FSA resolves this situation, we strongly encourage our customers with a peanut allergy to avoid products containing mustard of any kind. If in any doubt, please contact your Kitchen Manager. Food allergens can be obtained from a member of staff in all our restaurants within our primary and secondary schools, and for those using our primary online ordering system all food allergens are published on the website/app. Please be assured our teams are fully informed of allergens and will be able to answer any questions on site. If in any doubt, please contact safety@impactfood.co.uk
