A Challenging Curriculum

#BestOfBishop

The curriculum at Bishop Stopford School is designed, as Our Intent (on page 9) makes clear, to enable every student at the school to unlock their unique potential.

Underpinning our curriculum design is ambition. Schemes of work are academic, sequential and knowledge-driven and lessons have a rich language base and intellectual rigour inherent within them. As a consequence, we choose challenging content across subjects to study.

Year 7 students, for example, begin English by studying an anthology of poems which develops ambitious language and knowledge of poetic conventions. Geography students compare the physical and human domains of geography through topics such as flooding, Antarctica, development and Ghana. These are supported by other foci such as global fashion and climate change. Students explore social, economic, environmental and political issues, providing opportunities to question and challenge the complexities of our world. Moving into Key Stages Four and Five, Year 11 History students interrogate the complexities of the Cold War and draw parallels between this conflict and the current situation in Ukraine. A-Level Psychologists study a broad range of topics from biopsychology and social influence to schizophrenia.

By delivering such ambitious content, our students benefit from accessing "the best that has been thought and said". This not only prepares them well for public exams but also makes them ready for whatever challenges they face once they have left our school.



Safe Space

Evacuation and invacuation processes

I wrote to all parents earlier this week about our processes for emergencies. We have two different responses dependent on the situation:

- 1. *Evacuation.* This describes a response where we evacuate everyone in school to a safe, designated space. Identified members of staff sweep the building to ensure everyone has been able to evacuate safely. This is most typically used when the fire alarm sounds.
- 2. *Invacuation*. This is often called 'lockdown'. It refers to situations when the community remains within the buildings and responses are made based on instructions given via internal communication channels. Where possible, learning continues as normal until staff are notified that any perceived threat has been cleared. This is generally used where there is an unexpected incident which is potentially serious (eg an airborne concern such as a gas cloud or an animal on site.) Invacuation also covers the rare occasion when there is an external threat or an unknown situation on site.

Drills for these processes are practised with all on site regularly. Just last week, we ran a fire drill and we will hold another invacuation drill before the end of the school year. School leaders review the drills to consider if there are any improvements we can make.

Assemblies and tutor times are used to communicate arrangements with students, so that they feel confident about what to do when alarms sound.

Pupil Premiums & Free School Meals Allowance

Pupil Premium is available to students in Years 7-11.

Students receive Pupil Premium if they are in receipt of Free School Meals or have qualified for free school meals at any point in the past six years. The Pupil Premium funding directly benefits students who are eligible, helping to diminish outcome differences between them and their peers.

Free school meals means students in Years 7-13 have a £2.85 daily allowance towards the cost of a meal. It must be spent at lunchtime. This funding is automatically uploaded to the student's lunch account and does not carry over to a later date. (It is also not reflected in Parent Pay.)

You may be entitled to free school meals for your child(ren) if you receive one of the following benefits:

- Income Support
- Income Based Job Seekers Allowance
- Child Tax Credit Only (with income up to £16,190) with no element of Working Tax Credit
- National Asylum Seekers Support
- Guarantee Element of the State Pension Credit
- Employment and Support Allowance
- Universal Credit (Income Related)

All children entitled to free school meals will receive them until the end of the academic year. This continues even if your income increases as a 'transitional protection'.

From September 2026, the Department for Education intends to discontinue all protections but will extend eligibility criteria for free school meals.

Once an application is made, the outcome will be confirmed and families emailed with a reference number. North Northamptonshire Council processes the application and notifies us within 5 working days.
