## **Safe Space**

Since its release, the Netflix series *Adolescence* has dominated headlines because of its exploration of the influences on our young people. The series follows a young man accused of killing his female classmate and explores some reasons why there is a surge in violence against women and girls.

Stephen Graham, co-writer and star of the series hopes this encourages more conversation and greater levels of accountability. Young people are often protected from physical danger, but left alone to navigate the internet, where complex issues are often reduced to simple assertions and exploitation and grooming is rife.

This is what one of our Maths teachers thought about the series:

"Last week, I watched one of the most powerful dramas that I have seen in a long time, 'Adolescence'. Each episode follows a different aspect of the main character's arrest and the people whose lives are changed by it. There is a lot of discussion about the show and it is very unsettling how many people are commenting that it would never happen and passing it off as fiction. Unfortunately, it is far from it. The underlying message of the series are the influences that the internet and social media are having specifically on young boys, and the misogynistic attitudes that they are being fed. During the last episode of this series, the parents of the boy arrested said, "He was in his room; we thought he was safe". If your child has a device that they can access without restrictions or parental control, please be vigilant and please be aware that even though you may think they are safe under your roof, influencers are now far more insidious in the way that they foster ideologies in our young people and use social media as a way to do so. I would strongly recommend watching 'Adolescence' to understand this very real danger that our children will be exposed to."

As part of our continued work with students about online safety, healthy relationships and being upstanders against abuse in any form, we will focus in PSHE on the themes that arise from *Adolescence*. We will give students a forum to ask about incel culture, the manosphere and violence against women and girls, and build on their learning about how to recognise harmful content and avoid click bait.

All who attended learnt a great amount about their own minds and how other people's mental health can affect them indirectly. #### **U14 Hockey National State Schools Tournament**

For the first time, we took Girls' & Boys' teams to these finals, which was held at Nottingham Hockey Centre. The finals involved a round robin which then progressed into a knockout format. The boys finished 3<sup>rd</sup> in their group after a slow start but played some fantastic hockey. This meant they challenged for the National Bowl Title. The girls also finished 3<sup>rd</sup> in their group and due to goal difference went into the National Shield Competition.

The knockout games were obviously tense affairs, with the girls' semi-final coming down to penalty shuffles. The tension mounted as this too went to sudden death with Bishop going through to contest the final.

The boys in the knockout stages came of age and played some fantastic hockey, resulting in a handful of goals which had eluded them earlier on in the day.

Both boys and girls in their respective finals! Wow. We would have taken that, but the players had a different view and only went on to win both finals.

This resulted in the boys winning the **U14 National Bowl and** the Girls the **U14 National Bowl**.

This is a fantastic achievement on the national stage and one that I hope they can look back on with immense pride.



#### **U16 Rugby County Cup**

In their final game for the school, the Year 11 squad played in a County Cup Final v Sharnbrook Academy. This was a befitting conclusion for many of the boys whom have gone from strength to strength since joining the school as Year 7s back in 2020! The game was played at Northampton Saints and both schools brought a lot of support.

Bishop dominated the opening 20 minutes with a try from Ano Kangausaru and Ewan Neeson converting. Sharnbrook scored late in the first half meaning the game was tight. The second half started with 2 quick tries from Ano Kangausaru and Alfie Rimmer with Ewan Neeson converting one. A fantastic well-timed interception from Bobby Mackintosh prevented Sharnbrook from scoring. Bobby was unlucky a moment later when he went over the line only to be overruled as he lost control of the ball as 2 players tackled him over the line.

The response was swift with Ewan Neeson jinking down the touchline to dot down in the corner, converting again. The game went into the dying minute against a resilient Sharnbrook side who always looked dangerous in attack. Their efforts were rewarded in the final minute with a well taken try. Bishop was crowned champions winning 26-19. We are very proud of what the boys have achieved over the years: County Cup Winners: U13, U14 and now U16!
