A giant well done to Isla Dow who held a fundraising cake sale and provided squash, teas and coffees on Saturday in 28 degree heat for 'Cats Protection'.


Isla created the flyers, price list, canvassed neighbours, created Facebook and WhatsApp invitations and posts all with branding.

Safe Space



Anne Robertson Brown, executive director of Women's Aid in Angus, said more than 40 girls aged 18 and under had reported serious abuse from partners in the first five months of the year. From meetings with other organisations, it was clear that abuse is being replicated in every local authority in Scotland. Boys as young as 9 and 10 have been exhibiting misogynistic behaviour in primary schools.

The Netflix series *Adolescence* sought to expose the impact of the increasing time spent by teenagers online, often unsupervised. National police statistics that show a correlation between a rise in misogynistic language and behaviour and an increase in violence against women and girls. In our local area, this is a key strand of the 'Safe and Sound Communities' plan from Northamptonshire Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner Danielle Stone.

Our Year 9 students have the opportunity to explore this with their peers as part of a Multi-Agency Personal Development day. Students will meet professionals from the police, the Safeguarding Hub, health and NGAGE, a drugs and alcohol charity, to explore the influences they face, both on and offline.

We are very proud of the way our students interact and the care they show each other, but we will continue to keep our focus on building healthy relationships, recognising when they are not healthy, and knowing who to go to for support to keep everyone safe.

Open conversations at home and parental controls on internet-enabled devices, can be instrumental in keeping your child safe. These help them to manage the demands and challenges of social media which previous generations did not face.

As we return to normal lessons on Monday, students are expected to attend in school uniform. While the weather is likely to remain warm and dry, we are not expecting the very high temperatures we have seen over the past fortnight. We appreciate the conversations you have had at home regarding non-school uniform items and we have seen a significant reduction this week. For clarity:

- Students must be in school shoes, not trainers or other non-uniform footwear. This includes days when they have PE lessons.
- Students are allowed to wear a maximum of two pairs of stud earrings and one religious necklace or bracelet.
- Students must not wear other jewellery, including nose piercings. Additional jewellery will be confiscated and can be collected at the end of the school day.

Staff v Students Charity Debate

On Thursday 26th June, a team of four KS3 and 4 debaters went up against a team of staff in a formal parliamentary-style debate in aid of charity. The motion proposed by the staff team was 'This House would introduce a four-day school week', was opposed by our students. They confidently articulated well-researched rebuttal and raised fierce 'points of information', proving that months of practice of this style of debate had paid off. In the end, both the audience and judging panel – comprising staff and students – unanimously voted in favour of the student opposition, based on English Speaking Union criteria.

Aiyushi Modha (9P – Leader of the Opposition/First Speaker): "It was nerve-wracking to have such a big audience, but so exciting to finally debate our teachers."

Julia Dujka (9P – Timekeeper): "The points were very close, but I was rooting for the students!" It is safe to say our student debating teams are becoming formidably skilled – we can't wait to see how they perform in regional and national competitions next year.

Our debaters raised over £60 for Heart Link Children's Charity, a cause chosen by the debaters themselves: Barty Gardner (8D):

"Heart Link Children's Charity, based at Leicester Royal Infirmary, is very close to home for me. My brother had to have heart surgery in 2015 at less than a week old, and luckily, he is now 10 years old, still very healthy to this day. Heart Link supported our family by giving us accommodation, entertainment, and essentials for the time he was in hospital.
