
Our staff and governors have also been considering this very big question and what it means to them.

Who are Catch22

Catch22 is a national organisation with over 10 years of experience delivering specialist support for young people affected by county lines, child criminal exploitation and child sexual exploitation. We currently deliver the National County Lines Support and Rescue service- providing 1-2-1 support and a rescue service for young people and their families who are criminally exploited through county lines.

'Moonpig' Visit

Year 12 Business and Economics students had the opportunity to attend a talk from David Rimmer, General Manager of Moonpig. Known for revolutionising the online greetings card industry, Moonpig is a leading UK ecommerce brand which blends creativity with cutting-edge marketing, constantly adapting to the times.

Mr Rimmer offered insights into how A-level Business theory is applied in a successful company. For example, we studied the concept of added value, where a business increases the worth of a product by improving it or offering something extra. Moonpig adds value by letting customers personalise cards, offering next-day delivery, and bundling gifts like flowers — making the final product more special than a standard shop-bought card.

When asked by Kelechi, (Year 12), "What tips would you give to future entrepreneurs?" Mr Rimmer said, "Learn to optimise AI to your advantage, because most jobs in 10 years will be reliant on this." He explained that growing with the market — instead of letting it outgrow you — gives a competitive advantage. He also spoke about the risks of starting a business, explaining that even a great idea will fail without a strong business plan and proper research.

One student said, "David Rimmer gave us an engaging and insightful talk about his career and his role at Moonpig."

The talk left us feeling motivated and informed by real-world examples of business lesson theories. We're grateful to have had the opportunity to connect with an industry leader.
